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SERIAL TAILGATES SCHEDULED –MARK YOUR CALENDARS AND PLAN TO ATTEND!

The University of Nebraska Viticulture Program (UNVP) received such good response from the Regional Tailgates held last summer that we have decided to continue providing tailgates that are held during the week and start late in the afternoon. This concept enables interested grape and wine folks to participate after their “day job” and at the same time doesn’t conflict with weekend winery events, thus enabling winery personnel to attend as well. We have therefore scheduled two “serial” tailgates, one for the eastern part of the state and one in a more central location.

What do we mean by “serial” tailgates? The plan is to provide education at the same location over a series of meetings and follow the same vines throughout the growing season. The initial tailgate will focus on pruning information and hands-on pruning practice, discussion about yield management, evaluating and managing winter injury and other practices appropriate to late winter vineyard management. At each tailgate location, specific vines will be pruned and evaluated at the first tailgate; for the second tailgate, these same vines will be observed at about cap-fall (flowering time) with evaluation of the vines related to potential crop load, the need for cluster thinning (if any) and disease management issues. One or two later tailgates, probably near veraison and/or harvest, involving the same vines will allow participants to assess the impact of their pruning practices at the first tailgate and their treatments of the vines at the second tailgate that took place at cap-fall. MID-WINTER BUD DAMAGE

With temperatures plummeting to near-record lows in some locations, it is worth collecting a few canes and bringing them inside to evaluate bud damage and possibly cambial damage. Letting the canes warm up for a day or so may give a more accurate assessment of bud and cambium damage. Bud damage in the Lincoln area has been minimal following the daily low temperatures experienced as follows:

December 24, 2017 - +9.12 F
December 25, 2017 - +3.95 F
December 26, 2017 - +0.04 F
December 27, 2017 - **minus** 2.47 F
December 28, 2017 - +8.96 F
December 29, 2017 - +7.1 F
December 30, 2017 - **minus** 0.59 F
January 1, 2018 - **minus** 12.96 F
January 3, 2018 - +11.45 F
December 31, 2017 - **minus** 10.08
January 2, 2018 - **minus** 5.65 F
January 4, 2018 - +4.35 F
January 5, 2018 - +6.31 F
January 6, 2018 - +5.37 F
January 7, 2018 - +24.45

Results of cutting 50 buds taken on January 5, 2018 were:

Delaware - 98% primary bud survival
Frontenac - 100% primary bud survival
Leon Millot - 88% primary bud survival
Marquette - 76% primary bud survival
Edelweiss - 93% primary bud survival

Obviously this minimal damage will be of limited concern, but there are many more potential pitfalls as the grapevines continue in dormancy and begin to deacclimate. As always, timing is everything, including weather yet to come. It is always worth noting that management practices from the previous growing season will have had impacts on hardening in the fall, thus influencing winter hardiness. We will look forward to a potentially great vintage in 2018.

Death of Famed Illinois Vineyard Enthusiast Jim Nickell hits Nebraska Industry Hard

James F. (Jim) Nickell died on December 26, 2017. Jim was well-known by early Nebraska growers (Eric Nelson, Dale Lilyhorn and many more) who sought his sage advice when he attended several of the early Nebraska Winery and Grape Grower Forums and they reciprocated

by attending one or more of his annual field days produced by the Western Illinois Grape Producers Associated Corporation, affectionately nicknamed "WIGGPAC". Jim was one of the early founders of the Illinois Grape Growers and Vintners Association, in addition to founding the western Illinois organization (WIGGPAC). I was fortunate to get to know Jim upon his frequent trips to Nebraska and to be invited to speak at the WIGGPAC field day in 2002. He was passionate about all that he did, including his early careers in education and in livestock husbandry - he was especially proud of training and exhibiting his gaited mules. Jim loved to experiment on his 45+ acres of vineyard and enjoyed even more his passion for creating exceptional wines from the grapes that he grew, including numbered selections from the Cornell and Minnesota breeding programs. I recall fondly sampling wines in his cellar and taking a few bottles with me upon my departure. Perhaps one of the best of them was made from what he called New York 76 (now known as 'Aromella') - it was indeed really good. Jim was always happy to share gems of wisdom garnered from his vast experience and avid reading of viticultural literature. Jim, you will be missed by all who knew you.
